The idea of breath is significant in Christian belief. At the beginning of the Bible we're told: "God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul." In both Greek and Latin, one word is used for both breath and spirit (*pneuma* and *spiritus* respectively). The doctrine of The Holy Spirit – the "Breath of God" – is integral to Christian theology. This inspired the 19<sup>th</sup> century English Anglican priest, Edwin Hatch, to write one of my favourite hymns.

An academic most of his life – Professor of Classics at Trinity College, Toronto, and Vice-Principal of St Mary's Hall, Oxford, for example – Hatch was what the writer Ian Bradly describes as "a man of deep piety". Hatch's faith was as "simple and unaffected as a child's". Give me this simple faith in the Breath of God any time if it can create a such a hymn as Edwin Hatch offers to us. And, indeed, might Hatch's words not encapsulate the importance to the late Queen Elizabeth of faith in the Spirit of God?

Breathe on me, Breath of God, fill me with life anew, that I may love what thou dost love, and do what thou wouldst do.

Breathe on me, Breath of God, until my heart is pure, until with thee I will one will, to do and to endure.

Breathe on me, Breath of God, till I am wholly thine, till all this earthly part of me glows with thy fire divine.

Breathe on me, Breath of God, so shall I never die, but live with thee the perfect life of thine eternity.
