It wasn't a disaster, but a helpful reminder to be more careful with proof-reading in the future. I was reminded of J B Boothroyd's poem, *Please Excuse Typing,* from the 1965 publication, *The Fireside Book of Humorous Poetry.*

If you have ever, like me, Missed the "r" and hit the "t", Addressing some fat blister As "Mt." instead of "Mr.", I trust you left it unamended?

To help me, I'm happy to have people point out my errors. If errors are helpfully highlighted in order to improve what I do, I need to know what they are. Maybe *that's* the "glory in a great mistake", when I've learned from my error and resolved to do better today than I did yesterday.
