Words

"So is my word that goes out from my mouth. It will not return to me empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it." Bible, Isaiah 55:11 (New International Version)

I love words. Etymology is the history of a word: tracing its development since its earliest recorded occurrence in the language where it is found; investigating its transmission from one language to another; analysing it into its component parts; identifying its usage in other languages; tracing it to a common form in an ancestral language. It's a joy and a delight!

The etymology of the word *etymology*, for example, is straightforward. In Latin, *etymon* means "origin of a word", and comes from the Greek word *etymon*, meaning "literal meaning of a word according to its origin." The Greek *etymon* in turn comes from *etymos*, which means "true." But please don't confuse *etymology* with *entomology. Entomon* means "insect" in Greek. So *entomology* is the study of bugs! Didn't I say that my love of words is a joy and a delight?

Words matter. A great orator can sway a crowd using words in a stirring fashion. The effective words of a hymn, prayer or sermon can encourage faith. A word shared in a spirit of compassion can bring healing. A harsh word, thoughtlessly uttered, can cause untold harm. In 1837, Letitia Elizabeth Landon summed this up in *Ethel Churchill:*

> 'Tis a strange mystery, the power of words! Life is in them, and death. A word can send The crimson colour hurrying to the cheek, Hurrying with many meanings; or can turn The current cold and deadly to the heart. Anger and fear are in them; grief and joy Are on their sound; yet slight, impalpable – A word is but a breath of passing air.

Yes, indeed, in the "strange mystery" of language, words have power! So, as well as valuing their etymology, let's make sure that, as Isaiah advises, they accomplish the good purpose that we desire.

A prayer for today

Lord, "Your Word is a lamp for my feet and a light for my path." May my words serve the same purpose for others. Amen
